Chapter One: Can we Walk with God?

1. What special memories do you have that involve a walk?
2. What would it be like to have memories like that in regards to walking with God?
3. How does God feel about you?
4. What thoughts do you have about walking with God?

Chapter Two: Enoch Walked with God

1. What have you learned about Enoch so far?
2. What do you think it would look like to walk with God?
3. What do you think life was like in Enoch's time? Give specific ideas.



Chapter Three: Walking Together Invites Closeness

1. Why does God want to be close to you? How can this encourage you?
2. What are ways we can draw close to God through His Spirit?
3. Read James 4:1-9. How does this passage encourage closeness with God?

Chapter Four: Walking Together Encourages Focus

1. In life, what are you currently focusing on? What results are you seeing?
2. What specific steps can you take to focus more on God?
3. Read Psalm 119:97-104. What does this passage teach you about focusing on God?



Chapter Five: Walking Together Initiates Learning

1. What have you recently learned about God?
2. What would you like to learn about Him? Or, if you could ask Him anything, what would it be?
3. Read Ephesians 3:1-13. What did Paul learn ‘by revelation’ (vs. 3)? What does this passage teach you about the character of God?

Chapter Six: Walking Together Provides Protection

1. How have you seen God protect you in the past? How does this encourage you for the future?
2. What is keeping you from trusting God? Write out a prayer asking God to help you overcome that hurdle.
3. Read Deuteronomy 3:1-8. These words were intended for Joshua, but what do they teach you about God’s character? How does that apply to your life?



Chapter Seven: Walking Together Allows for Shared Experiences

1. What is God asking you to do today? It can be detailed directions or general guidance.
2. Read John 17:20-26. What does this teach you about the heart of God, especially in regards to doing life with God?
3. What is God wanting to do in and through you today?

Chapter Eight: Walking Together Strengthens Harmony

1. What did Jesus save you from? (Be specific.)
2. How have you broken harmony with God? With the Spirit's help, what are you doing to repair the broken harmony?
3. Read Romans 3:21-28. What does this teach you about God?



Chapter Nine: Walking Together Produces Accountability

1. Who can you tell anything to? Describe why this is. Do you feel like you have a relationship like this with God? Why or why not?

2. Read Romans 14:8-12. What do these verses teach you? How can they encourage you?

Chapter Ten: Walking Together Shows Support

1. When has someone stood up for you or with you? What was the experience like?

2. When have you stood up for or with someone else? What happened?

3. Read Matthew 11:27-28. A yoke is a frame that connects two draft animals to allow them to work together. Putting animals together increases the amount of work that can be done exponentially. Often, a stronger, more experienced animal was paired with a younger, weaker, and/or less experienced animal to train. What does this teach you about the character of God?



Chapter Eleven: Walking Together is Fun

1. How do you like to have fun with your family or friends? How did you see God in those times?
2. How can you look for ways to enjoy God?
3. Read John 10:7-15. What does this teach you about God's heart toward you?

Chapter Twelve: How to Walk with God

1. What is God asking you to do today? Is there anything you need to give up?
2. Read Ephesians 1:3-14. What does this reveal about God's heart? How can this encourage you to walk with God?
